PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Kia ora, Talofa lava, Malo e lelei, Kia orana, Ni sa bula vinaka, Fakatalofa atu, Fakaalofa lahi atu. It's been a hectic term for reasons I am sure you are aware of! Covid certainly hit us hard and disrupted the start to the year, but the good news is we have settled back into something close to normality!

Unfortunately students missed out on some of those highlights we love here at Wesley, Service of Beginnings, athletics and swimming sports days to name a few. However we have retained as much structure and enjoyment as we could.

I can't thank staff across the campus enough for their fierce determination to keep things running at our school. I would also like to thank all our whanau for their understanding and support of us all during these challenging times.

The key, particularly for senior students, is to reset their focus and make sure they achieve the goals they set at the start of the year. There is an expectation for every student that they will have 20 credits by the end of term 1, check in with your son/daughter to see how they are going with this. Onwards and upwards!

Cultural Renovation

Bullying is an issue that all schools will experience at one time or another. However, we have acknowledged that it has been part of Wesley for far too long. The College has a long, incredibly rich history of doing great things and being an amazing place for so many students. But the spectre of institutionalised bullying has been a thorn in our side.

The Royal Commission into Abuse in Care report on systemic bullying at Wesley is a stark reminder to us that we need to continually work on this area.

Bullying at Wesley seems to have manifested itself into a self-perpetuating prophecy where small groups of students have convinced themselves it's not really bullying, but part of a 'tradition', a 'Wesley Way' that somehow gives them a hierarchical privilege that allows them to 'discipline' students. This is far from reality, many past students denounce this idea.

Over the years progress has been made. The focus on highlighting that it is not part of our culture and academic achievement success across the school has seen real shifts in student attitudes towards bullying.

Traditionally, many schools have responded to bullying incidents using a punitive approach. While it has relevance, this approach provides few opportunities for students (or teachers and whanau) to learn new ways to

manage social behaviours to instigate 'cultural renovation' i.e. to hang on to all the things that make this College great, and to get rid of the parts we don't want.

Real change happens when students, staff, whanau, and other members of the community share responsibility for making their school a respectful and inclusive environment.

This is where our parent committee comes in and thank you to over 50 parents/caregivers who have put their hand up to be a part of our change! The approach over the next few years needs to focus on mobilising our whanau and students and empowering them to make change.

Parents, students and our community have spoken, every student, male and female, has the right to feel safe and secure, but more importantly to experience the rich opportunities that this school provides.

Starting at Home, some simple things to ask your children:

- Do you bully?
- Do any of your friends bully or discipline other students?
- Do you stop bullying when you see it? (or are you a bystander)
- Do you know kids who have been bullied and how do you support them?
- Do you believe you have the right to discipline or touch any other students?
- Do you report bullying when you see it or do you simply turn a blind eye?




YEAR 10 SOCIAL STUDIES

GATEWAY CAREERS VISITORS



On Monday 21 February students were introduced to entrepreneur Sawyer Paul, 21 years of age, a music manager and founder of Astro clothing label.

Sawyer has forged himself a successful portfolio career in areas he feels passionate about. He shared with students his journey from leaving school and starting his business from scratch.

He shared the difference between 'networking' and 'social climbing' and gave students insights into making that first cold call/ message.

Students were able to ask individual questions about the industries they are looking to move into post school and hear the pitfalls and challenges he faced when he started out developing his own business.



AKONGOUE PASIFIKA HORTICULTURE PROGRAM

NZ Sports Turf, Tongan Youth Trust, Ministry for Pacific Peoples, Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment and the Agriculture & Investment Services launched the Akongoue Pacific Horticulture program on 16th March with an opening ceremony at the Up skills Facility in Mangere. Wesley students did us proud introducing themselves and leading the hymns at the service. This was of course followed with some delicious kai.

Ten Wesley students will commence the year long course next Wednesday along with students from 5 other schools. They will be picked up from school in the morning and delivered back to school at the end of the school day. They have both classroom learning and workplace learning and have the opportunity to earn up to 35 level 3 unit standard credits towards an NZ Certificate in Horticulture and at level 2, 45 unit standard credits towards an NZ Certificate in Primary Industry Skills. Students are expected to catch up on work they have missed in class on a Wednesday, and the Tongan Trust are providing mentors to assist students with this.

This programme will introduce a range of STEM subjects including:

- Practical horticulture (health and safety, planting, harvesting, packing/grading)
- Biodiversity/security, green technologies and sustainability
- Engineering related technologies
- Business, sales, marketing and digital technologies
- Manufacturing, logistics and research and science.

Students will also earn industry credentials such as Site Safe, Growsafe, First Aid, Forklift and Tractor operations.

It is a fantastic opportunity and I wish the students all the very best in learning about this industry and the employment opportunities it can offer.



DINES ENGINEERING TRIP



On Thursday ,10 March 18 senior students were given the opportunity to visit the Dines Construction site at Paerata Rise. The students were interested in career areas such as Engineering, Roading design, Earthworks, Surveying and Drain laying.

Students got to see first hand the huge machinery at work and how a working site operates.

Student questions included how long does it take to develop an area such as Paerata Rise. how long does it take to build your career to become the boss,





what is the likely salary if employed, is there overseas opportunities and how do you develop your own company to contract services when you are skilled on machinery.

Students gained a lot of information from the opportunity and now have some insight into other work opportunities that are available when they leave school.

MITO AUTOMOTIVES PROGRAM

We currently have four year 12 and one year 11 student enrolled to complete a MITO 'Start Up' programme in Automotives.

These students have 6 modules complete online (in their own time) and they will go out into a work placement to get some hands-on experience in the automotive industry. When completed, they will have earned 20 credits towards level 2.

If students enjoy the programme, there is the opportunity to carry on next year and complete the level 3 advance programmes in either collision repair or automotive engineering.



SPORTS UPDATE

Following the Governments announcement a few weeks ago, sport is back. Sport is now open to all students regardless of their vaccination status. This change came into effect midnight Saturday, 12 March.

We are absolutely elated to have all our students participating in school sports again.

However, please note that while we can have our students involved in sport, we still ask that spectators/supporters stay away from events due to the current covid restrictions on gathering limits.

As soon as these limits are removed, we look forward to welcoming back all our wonderful Wesley supporters, who are just as import as the students themselves.

PRINCIPAL'S ENDEAVOUR SCHOLARSHIP - SPIRIT OF ADVENTURE

We are very excited to offer our second Principal's Endeavour Scholarship aboard the training ship 'Spirit of New Zealand'. This scholarship is very generously sponsored by Jaedon Manufacturing.

There is **one** scholarship available for a current Wesley student aged 16 – 18 who has consistently demonstrated the school Kairangi values of Family, Respect, Responsibility and Excellence.

The scholarship covers the full cost (\$2,500) of a place on a 10-day Development Voyage.

The voyage should be undertaken within one year of the scholarship being awarded. The recipient will be expected to arrange their own transportation to and from the ship. This is usually Prince's Wharf, Auckland, but occasionally there is the opportunity to join the ship elsewhere in the country should you choose to do so.

To be considered for this scholarship you must:

- Meet the Spirit of Adventure criteria for participation
- Have very good attendance at school
- Model our Kairangi Values of Family, Responsibility, Respect and Excellence
- Not have participated in a previous Spirit of Adventure trip
- Participate in a fundraising activity for Spirit of Adventure to help others get aboard

2022 Bring your Own Device - BYOD

A reminder that we would like all students to have access to a e-learning device. It is expected that all Year 9, 10 and 11 students at Wesley College in 2022 will bring their own learning device to school every day. Here's some information to help families start planning:

- All students in 2022 will have access to our robust, monitored and secure Wi-Fi network to support and enhance their learning. Students will be able to demonstrate their learning, access course material and resources through google applications also known as the G-suite. Students are also able to access their timetable, results and other details through our student portal. Students use cloud storage within the Google Apps environment as well as Dropbox and OneDrive to store their documents.
- Parents with a "Parent Portal" access allows parents to become more involved with their child's progress at school. By going online, parents are able to view student timetables, up to date attendance data, course details and student results.
- Any device can be used for BYOD, however we insist that it is not of a tablet type and has a screen of no less than 11 inches.
- Students in years 9, 10 and 11 are able to purchase the preferred subsidised device which is an ACER Chromebook at a cost of \$325.00.
