## PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

We have had a terrific start to the school term. It is so good being back in Chapel every morning to remind us that we are at a Methodist and Christian school, and that every day we should be aspiring to live to the bible the best we can.

Official NCEA and UE results for 2021 were recently released. Our results weren't as high as previous years, but they are still very good and set up the expectation that academic achievement is an expectation at Wesley College! It is now our duty to ensure we continue to raise this expectation that every student at Wesley will succeed. All results, including UE, are well above national averages for decile 1 – 3 schools, however we prefer to measure ourselves against ALL students in New Zealand and national averages!

The one thing we learned last year is the importance of students getting NCEA credits built up at the start and during the year, rather than waiting to really push themselves from around August on. This just didn't happen last year for many students when Covid hit in mid August and they were caught short in the end. As we know, we are currently experiencing a bad flu going around Auckland therefore the message is clear, do not delay and get the work done now!

Thank you for ensuring your children are back in the hostels by 5pm on Sundays ready for school Monday morning. Thank you to all parents/caregivers who are contacting me when they have genuine reasons why their children have to be away from school. Being at school is a crucial aspect of student academic achievement. We are working together to ensure our students have every chance of success!

#### 2021 Wellbeing Review – continued responses

# Stymie in our school

Today all of our students attended a presentation about Stymie and how they can now use it in our school.

Stymie is an anonymous reporting tool that your child can use to report any form of harm. To others, themselves or their school community.

Notifications are made through <a href="https://www.stymie.co.nz">www.stymie.co.nz</a> and involve submitting information such as - who are you making a notification about? Where did it happen? What happened? How often is this happening?

Students are then able to attach screenshots to their notification that may contain supportive evidence.

The notification then lands in email format with the nominated staff members from our school. We are then able to offer support to the person the notification is about, and they will know that they are not alone.

Stymie takes away the fear of reporting information by empowering bystanders, because it is 100% anonymous.

Stymie has been presented to all students in our school. Topics also touched on were bullying, online actions and the sharing of nudes.








# WHAT ARE SCHOOL BOARDS?

All of New Zealand's state and state-integrated schools have a school board which is the Crown entity responsible for the governance of the school.

#### The board:

- ensures every student can reach their highest possible standard in student achievement
- is the employer of all staff in the school
- sets the school's strategic direction in consultation with parents, whānau, staff, students and the wider school community
- is responsible for overseeing the management of personnel, curriculum, property, finance and administration

#### **Board membership:**

There are three types of representative members who are elected onto the board. These "representative" board members are elected by the parent community, staff members and, in the case of schools with students above Year 9, the students.

There are also other types of board members, including the principal, co-opted and appointed board members.

A standard school board's membership includes:

- Parent or selected trustee (usually five)
  the Principal of the school
  one staff elected trustee
  one student elected trustee (in schools with students above Year 9)
- state integrated schools: four board members appointed by the proprietor
  The board can co-opt additional people onto the board for gender, skill or ethnic balance, and the
  Minister of Education can appoint an additional board member.

We'll also be able to help create guidance for whānau and communities about how schools can build good relationships and processes in order to plan and report well.

We will be collecting your role in relation to the school community, alongside your feedback, so that we can understand the context.

Feedback will be received by the Ministry of Education.


Parents/caregivers of students already on the 2022 Gateway programme will also have the opportunity to book an appointment to discuss their son/daughter's progress.
