#### PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

We have had a terrific start to the school term. It is so good being in Chapel every morning to remind us that we are at a Methodist school, and that every day we should be aspiring to live to the bible the best we can.

Official NCEA and UE results for 2022 were recently released. Our results weren't as high as previous years, but they are still good enough to provide inspiration that we can get back to the highest levels! It is now our duty and challenge to ensure we continue to raise the expectation that every student at Wesley will succeed.

The one thing we learned over the past few years is the importance of students getting NCEA credits built up at the start and during the year, rather than waiting to really push themselves from around August on. This just didn't happen last year for many students when they were caught short in the end. So the message is clear do not delay and get the work done now!

The 1<sup>st</sup> XV have had an excellent start to the season, drawing with the Auckland 1A Champion of the past two years, and beating Rotorua Boys to win the Grinter Cup. We look forward to the rest of the season and also all our boys' and girls' sports teams getting their respective seasons underway.

Thank you for ensuring your children are back in the hostels by Sunday 5pm ready for school Monday morning. Thank you to all parents/caregivers who are contacting me when they have genuine reasons why their children have to be away from school. Attendance at school is a crucial aspect of student academic achievement. We are working together to ensure our students have every chance of success!

Day students also need to be on time every day. Our current attendance for this term is around 85% therefore, with some extra work we can get that well over 90%.

**RUGBY**: As the winter sports season rolls into full swing in the coming weeks, the 1st XV rugby team enjoyed an excellent pre-season in which managed a narrow 13-12 win over Tauranga Boys. The team then held on for a noteworthy 19-19 draw with Auckland 1A champions Kelston Boys High School.
